PRAIRIE PAWS OFFERS \$10 MICROCHIPPING

The Prairie Paws Animal Adoption Center offers \$10 microchipping for animals in Grand Prairie. Microchipping provides the peace of mind that you've given your pet the permanent, lifetime ID he needs for the best chance to come home. To have your pet microchipped, bring them to the Prairie Paws Animal Adoption Center, 2222 Warrior Tr., Tuesday-Friday, 10 a.m.-6 p.m. and Saturday 10 a.m.-5 p.m. (closed noon-1 p.m. for lunch).

Here's how it works:

- The microchip is inserted with a simple injection. It does not hurt your pet, and provides no more discomfort than a vaccination.
- Enroll your pet's ID code along with your contact information so that your pet can be positively identified.
- If your pet is taken to an animal shelter or clinic, the staff will scan the microchip to read its unique ID code.
- The staff will then call the appropriate registry with your pet's ID code.
- As soon as your contact information is retrieved, you will be contacted and arrangements will be made to reunite you with your pet.

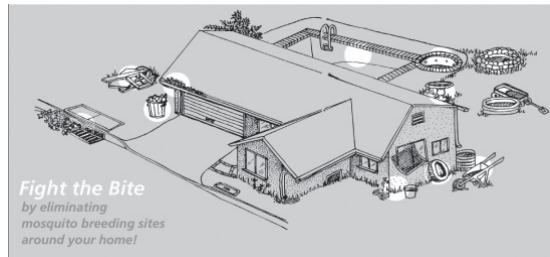

STOP RAISING MOSQUITOES IN YOUR YARD

Remember, standing water means mosquitoes. Any standing, stagnant water that remains for 7 to 10 days after a rain can, and usually will, produce mosquitoes. For example, one coffee can full of water has been shown to produce in excess of 10,000



mosquitoes over an entire summer season

- Empty all water holding containers in your yard on a regular basis, at least once a week, children's wading pools, rain barrels, buckets, bird baths and stored boats are prime examples of mosquito breeding sites.
- Over-watering and poor irrigation practices are common producers of mosquitoes around the home, in parks and on golf courses. Report standing water to appropriate maintenance personnel.
- Clean out eaves' troughs and down spouts of leaves and other debris that slow drainage.
- Ditches must be kept free of vegetation and other debris to promote rapid drainage, and pond edges should be kept clean of cattails and other aquatic vegetation. This is where mosquito larvae develop and mature.
- To reduce the number of adult mosquitoes in your yard: keep your lawn mowed as short as is practical.
- Keep all ornamental shrubs and bushes trimmed and pruned to open them up to light and air flow. This will not only give mosquitoes one less place to hide, but will promote growth and vigor in the plant.
- Cut back as far as possible, all low, dense under-growth surrounding your yard. This is where mosquitoes go to hide during the day.
- Have large trees trimmed to allow sunlight to penetrate dark, damp areas.

GRAND PRAIRIE LAND USE AND ZONING

People often ask, "How do we ensure that a certain restaurant or shop is built," or sometimes more importantly, "is not built in our neighborhood?" City staff and your elected officials work hard to ensure that all land use decisions are in the best interest of our community. Zoning and the Comprehensive Plan provide the basic framework for the types of land uses that are allowed or not allowed in a particular area, but they cannot dictate for example that a Starbucks or a H.E.B grocery be built at a certain location. When a zoning change or other significant land use application is filed, all property owners within 300 feet are notified and are welcome to participate in the public hearing process.

On October 22, 1950, the City of Grand Prairie adopted its first zoning map and ordinance. Today, every property within the city is zoned with one of 27 separate zoning districts adopted by the city or with a site specific special zoning district called a Planned Development. These different zoning districts allow certain land uses and prevent other land uses. They also establish minimum lot size, property line setback standards, maximum building height standards and other dimensional and architectural standards.

In 2010, the city adopted a 25-year Comprehensive Plan to help guide the city's growth and development. This plan helps city staff and officials make

HOUSEHOLD HAZ WASTE COLLECTION

Paint is by far the most common item brought to our household hazardous waste (HHW) collection events. Remember, you can dispose of latex (water-based) paint by taking the lid off, letting it dry completely, and placing it in your trash. Oil-based paints and solvents should be brought to a collection event or taken to the Environmental Collection Center in Fort Worth. There is a maximum limit of 30 gallons of paint per household at our events.

Along with proper disposal, one of the most important things you can do is to reduce the amount of paint waste you generate. Buy only what you need.

Our next HHW event will be Saturday, June 8, 9-11 a.m. at the Development Center located at 206 West Church Street. We will accept household and automotive batteries, pharmaceuticals, motor oil, cooking oil, paint, aerosol cans, fluorescent bulbs, and household, landscape, and pool chemicals. We will not accept explosives, gas cylinders, fireworks, medical waste, radioactive materials, or municipal trash. No commercial waste will be accepted.

LAWN CARE FOR YOUR HOME - DON'T BAG IT!

Grand Prairie does not pick up grass clippings from your curb (or alley), to help save valuable space in the city landfill. You can do your part by leaving clippings on the lawn, and letting them work back into the soil for a vibrant green lawn. Here are nine easy steps to improve your lawn (and keep grass out of the landfill):

1. **Mow Less** - Longer blades of grass crowd out the weeds.
2. **Stop Raking** - By cutting off a third of the blade of grass, you can leave the clippings on the lawn as fertilizer.
3. **Stop Dethatching** - Unless your lawn has been over-fertilized, thatch (a build-up of roots) just above the soil isn't a problem.
4. **Fertilize Less** - Generally, use a total of three pounds of nitrogen per 1,000 sq. ft. in at least three carefully timed treatments over a season.
5. **Spray Less/No Herbicide** - Healthy grass should crowd out weeds.
6. **Spray Less/No Insecticide** - Diagnose first. If you have bug problems, contact your County Extension agent to help identify what is eating your grass.
7. **Water Less** - A typical lawn can soak up 10,000 gallons in a summer. One solution is to wean your lawn from overwatering. Wait until a foot-print does not spring back, then water as little as 1/4" a week to keep the roots alive. If it's very dry, protect your lawn by cutting down on traffic. TIP: For lawns with sprinkler systems, place containers by the sprinkler heads to measure the amount of water used in that area.
8. **Accept Imperfection** - If the site gets fewer than four hours of sun or is unsuited for grass, then try another ground cover.
9. **Xeriscaping/Drought Tolerant Landscaping** - Consider using colorful native plants or hardscapes such as naturally colored rocks and gravel instead of grass, but check with your homeowner associations first.

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sound decisions regarding proposed land development that could have a long term impact on the city. The plan also provides residents, property owners, and developers with surety that all property in Grand Prairie will be developed in a manner consistent with the plan. A review of the plan is done every five years and the plan is updated annually to incorporate text amendments and approved changes to the future land use map.

Zoning and the Comprehensive Plan govern what type of development can occur on your property and neighboring properties all over Grand Prairie. For example, the owner of a property zoned for commercial purposes cannot obtain a permit to build a single-family home on the property or if the property is zoned for residential uses the owner cannot obtain a permit to build a fast food restaurant on the property. Zoning also protects property values by ensuring that incompatible land uses are not located next to each other. No one wants a landfill or other heavy industrial use built next to their home.

FLOOD INSURANCE AVAILABLE TO RESIDENTS



Basic homeowner's insurance policies do not cover damage from floods. The city of Grand Prairie participates in the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) which means that federally subsidized flood insurance is available to everyone in the city. There is a 30-day waiting period before a policy becomes effective. Some people have purchased flood insurance because it was required by the bank or loan company when they obtained a mortgage or home improvement loan. Usually these policies just cover the building's structure and not the contents. A flood insurance policy must be renewed each year.

Mandatory Purchase Requirement: The mandatory purchase requirement applies to all forms of federal or federally related financial assistance for buildings located in a Special Flood Hazard Area (SFHA). This requirement affects loans and grants for the purchase, construction, repair or improvement of any publicly or privately owned buildings in a SFHA, including machinery, equipment, fixtures and furnishings contained in such buildings. If a building is located in a SFHA, the agency or lender is required by law to require the recipient to purchase a flood insurance policy on the building.
