HOUSEHOLD HAZ WASTE COLLECTION PROPER STORAGE AND DISPOSAL OF POOL CHEMICALS

Pool chemicals can become a hazard when wetted by a small quantity of water or when they are improperly mixed. Most pool chemicals are intended to be added to large quantities of water. If a small amount of water splashes or drips onto a chemical, it may trigger a strong reaction resulting in a fire or release of toxic vapor. Inadvertent mixing of chemicals may occur due to spillage or leakage. It is essential to ensure chemicals are stored in a cool dry place, containers are in good condition, and that incompatible chemicals are separated from each other.

A safer alternative is to convert your existing pool to a salt water system. Salt water pools are more expensive initially, but less costly to maintain than traditional pools and greatly reduce the amount of hazardous chemicals you have to purchase, store, and handle.

Unwanted pool chemicals can be disposed of at our next household hazardous waste collection events on Saturday, Oct. 5, and Nov. 16, from 9 a.m. to 11 a.m. at the Development Center, 206 West Church Street (next to City Hall).

We will accept household and automotive batteries, pharmaceuticals, motor oil, cooking oil, paint, aerosol cans, fluorescent bulbs, and household, landscape, and pool chemicals. We will not accept explosives, gas cylinders, fireworks, medical waste, radioactive materials, or municipal trash. No commercial waste will be accepted.

KEEP GRASS CLIPPINGS OUT OF STORM DRAINS

Please note that it is illegal to sweep or blow grass clippings into the street and hence the city storm drains. The city code specifically states that it is unlawful to allow any grass clippings, leaves, or debris to collect on any curb, gutter, storm inlet, storm drain, or watercourse. The clippings and debris can clog storm drains causing street flooding and environmental issues in our waterways.

HEARTWORM DETECTION AND PREVENTION

Heartworm disease is a potentially fatal condition caused by parasitic worms living in the heart and pulmonary arteries of dogs and other mammals. The disease is not spread directly from dog to dog, but it is spread by mosquitoes. When a mosquito bites an animal infected with heartworms, they take in the animal's blood and eventually spread the disease by biting another animal. If you suspect your dog or cat may have heartworms, seek the advice of a qualified veterinarian immediately. With prompt detection, needless suffering can be prevented. Consult your veterinarian for an appropriate prevention program for your pet.

NEW TECHNOLOGY KILLS MOSQUITOES

In July 2013, the city of Grand Prairie purchased a revolutionary tool, that kills the mosquito larvae or renders them flightless.

The Larvasonic emits sound waves into pools of stagnant water. The sound waves resonate at the frequency of mosquito larvae internal air volume, causing the larvae to burst and be killed or left flightless.

The city of Grand Prairie is using aerial photos to find vacant and un-kempt swimming pools and backed-up drainage ditches in which mosquitoes are likely breeding. They then travel to the site, apply a larvicide and send sound waves into the pool with the Larvasonic.

FLASHING YELLOW LEFT TURN ARROW SIGNALS

Flashing yellow left turn arrow signals are coming to Grand Prairie by early October. The green arrow provides a protected left turn from oncoming traffic while the flashing yellow arrow indicates left-turning traffic must first yield to oncoming traffic and pedestrians before turning. The steady yellow arrow and steady red arrow work the same as they always have.



Drivers will see one of the following indications as they approach a signal with a flashing yellow left-turn arrow display:

- Steady Red Arrow –** Drivers turning left must stop and wait.
- Steady Yellow Arrow –** Drivers are warned the left-turn signal is about to turn red. Do not enter the intersection if you can stop safely. Vehicles in the intersection should complete their turn.
- Flashing Yellow Arrow –** Drivers are allowed to turn left after yielding to oncoming traffic and pedestrians. (Oncoming traffic has a green light.) Drivers must determine if there is an adequate gap before turning!
- Steady Green Arrow –** Proceed with left turn; drivers making a left turn have the right-of-way. This sequence may be skipped if no left-turning vehicles are detected by the signal system.
