DO YOUR PART ELIMINATE MOSQUITOES AND OZONE POLLUTION.

Summer weather is sunshine and warm temperatures, but when these combine with air pollution, it also can mean an increase in air pollution and ozone action days. Summer is also the optimal time for mosquito bites. You can protect yourself and your family by following a few simple practices:

Air Pollution in the form of ground level ozone occurs when we have both high temperatures and emissions of certain gases like from cars. For people who work or exercise strenuously outdoors or have respiratory conditions, ozone can be a threat to their health as well as an environmental concern. Sign up for air pollution alerts at airnorthtexas.org to find out if it will be an ozone action day. Ozone action days occur when the air becomes unhealthy and measures should be taken to limit time outside.

Mosquitoes in our area can carry West Nile Virus and other viruses, so it is important that we stay alert to protecting against bites.

Dress: Wear long, loose fitting, light-colored clothing when outdoors.

DEET: Use insect repellent products containing "DEET" following the product label for application.

Drain: Eliminate ALL standing water. Remove, cover or invert any containers that can collect and hold standing water (bottles, cans, buckets, flower pots, tires, trash containers, etc.) Change water in pet dishes, bird baths, wading pools, etc. Remove litter, leaves, grass clippings, etc. from roof gutters/downspouts and French drain systems so water will properly drain.

Dusk & Dawn: Stay indoors during dusk and dawn when mosquitoes are most active.

EMERALD ASH BORER

The emerald ash borer (EAB) is a destructive and invasive pest that is killing trees in North America. EAB is very aggressive and may kill ash trees within a few years after infestation if not treated.

According to the Texas Forest Service, "urban tree canopy inventories estimate that ash trees comprise approximately 5 percent of the Dallas/Fort Worth urban forest."

The signs of an emerald ash borer infestation are: Tree canopy dieback, thinning, yellowing and browning of leaves, initially in the upper 1/3 of the tree and D-shaped holes in the bark. Trees die within three to five years after becoming infested, but small trees may die within one to two years after infestation. The good news is that they can be saved if caught on time. BRUSH PICK UP

For the convenience of Grand Prairie residents, the city operates a Brush Pickup Program. This once-per-month service provides curbside pickup of tree limbs and brush that are not bundled or bagged, no larger than 10 inches in diameter, no longer than 5 feet in length and the pile is no larger than a VW Beetle. This is for brush and tree limbs that are too large for the city's twice-weekly garbage collection., which must be bundled, weigh less than 50 pounds and be no more than 6 feet long. **To find out your brush pick up week, visit gptx.org/brushpickup.**

This service is for residents who trim their own brush and limbs. For residents who hire a contractor or tree service, the vendor must haul away what they trim.

The City of Grand Prairie does not provide brush pickup services to private gated communities or private mobile home communities.

FLOOD INSURANCE LETTER FROM THE MAYOR

Dear Resident,

A flood can devastate your home and your financial stability. Any flood – even a small one – can result in expensive repairs. Floodwaters are a mixture of mud, sewage, animal waste and chemicals. Floods ruin floors, walls, and carpets. Everything from appliances to your furniture may have to be thrown away. You have seen the pictures of household items thrown to the curb following devastating flood events in Texas and across our nation.

Without flood insurance, you are on your own. Your standard homeowner's insurance policy does not cover flood damages. The government will not help you pay for necessary repairs following a flood. The president must declare a flood as a disaster before federal assistance can be made available. Even when floods are declared disasters, financial assistance is typically provided in the form of a loan that you will have to pay back with interest.

Flooding is America's #1 disaster. You don't have to live near a major creek or waterway to be flooded. Severe storms, downed trees, and debris dumped in creeks can all cause flooding. The good news is that flood insurance can be surprisingly affordable. If you live in a moderate-to-low risk area, the typical flood insurance policy costs approximately less than \$500 yearly for building and contents coverage. If you rent and do not own your home, you can purchase "contents only" coverage to protect your belongings.

Anyone in the City of Grand Prairie can purchase flood insurance. You do not have to live in the 1% annual chance (100-year) floodplain to purchase flood insurance. The majority of private property flood damage reported to the city in 2015 was located outside the 1% annual chance floodplain.

Floods can happen in a short period of time. Flash flooding can happen with very little warning. The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) typically has a 30-day waiting period before flood insurance becomes effective. If you wait until a flood is predicted, you may not be able to get flood insurance coverage in advance of the storm.

The city's Stormwater Department provides a comprehensive flood information program to the public. Residents may access flood risk information and other flood information by calling the city Stormwater Department at 972-237-8321, and meeting with a department representative in person, or by accessing the city's website at www.gptx.org/floodplain.

Do you want to know the flood zone of your property to determine your flood risk? The city can provide a map information service enabling all residents the ability to determine the flood zone of a specific property. FEMA Flood Insurance Rate Maps (FIRMs) are available for viewing at City Hall. Current FIRMs can be found at the following link on the city's website: www.gptx.org/floodplain and at the FEMA Flood Map Store at <https://msc.fema.gov/portal>. Don't let a flood wash away your financial future. Get flood insurance.... before it's too late!
