SUMMER SAFETY TIPS FOR PET PARENTS

With the hot weather setting in, it's important to remember that pet health should be kept top of mind to help ensure a safe season for all. Summer dangers for pets include:

 $1. \ {\bf Fireworks \ and \ Thunderstorms} -$

Loud noises like fireworks are one of the top reasons pets go missing,

so secure your pet in an escape-proof place.

- 2. **Sun and Heat** High summer temperatures and bright days can mean dehydration, overheating and scorched paws. Know the signs of overheating (excessive panting, increased heart rate and weakness) and bring your pup indoors or to a cool, shady place.
- 3. Toxic Chemicals Insecticides, citronella products and glow sticks are toxic to pets. Keep your pet away from areas where chemicals have been sprayed and ensure dangerous products are out of reach.
- 4. **Parties and Barbecues** If your pet is joining the party, make sure guests don't feed your pet human food (especially grapes, onions, avoca do, and chocolate) and ensure alcoholic drinks are kept out of your pet's reach.
- 5. Hot Cars Even with the windows open an inch, a car's temperature can reach over 100 degrees in 10 minutes on an 85 degree day. One quick errand can turn dangerous in minutes, so leave your pet safely at home.

New Elevated Water Tank



Construction is underway on a new 149-foot elevated water storage tank just east of SH 161 and north of Marshall Drive. Scheduled to be complete and online in October 2024, the new tank will hold 2 million gallons of water, double the capacity of the old tank, and will serve EpicCentral, Traders Village and surrounding neighborhoods. According to engineers from Freese and Nichols, it will increase water quality and provide additional operational flexibility in the city's water system. A logo will be painted on the top portion of the tank, and the entire structure will be lit with RGB lighting that can be changed for holidays and special celebrations. It will also feature an area for Fire Department rappelling training. Once the new tank is online in 2024, the old water tank will be demolished.

FLOOD INSURANCE LETTER FROM THE MAYOR

Dear Resident.

A flood can devastate your home and your financial stability. Any flood even a small one - can result in expensive repairs. Floodwaters are a mixture of mud, sewage, animal waste and chemicals. Floods ruin floors, walls, and carpets. Everything from appliances to your furniture may have to be thrown away. You have seen the pictures of household items thrown to the curb following, devastating flood events in Texas and across our nation. Without flood insurance, you are on your own. Your standard homeowner's insurance policy does not cover flood damages. The government will not help you pay for necessary repairs following a flood. The president must declare a flood as a disaster before federal assistance can be made available. Even when floods are declared disasters, financial assistance is typically provided in the form of a loan that you will have to pay back with interest. Flooding is America's #1 disaster. You don't have to live near a major creek or waterway to be flooded. Severe storms, downed trees, and debris dumped in creeks can all cause flooding. The good news is that flood insurance can be surprisingly affordable. If you live in a moderate-to-low risk area, the typical flood insurance policy costs approximately less than \$500 yearly for building and contents coverage. If you rent and do not own your home, you can purchase "contents only" coverage to protect your belongings. Anyone in the City of Grand Prairie can purchase flood insurance. You do not have to live in the 1% annual chance (100-year) floodplain to purchase flood insurance. The majority of private property flood damage reported to the city in 2015 was located outside the 1% annual chance floodplain. Floods can happen in a short period of time. Flash flooding can happen with very little warning. FEMA typically has a 30-day waiting period before flood insurance becomes effective. If you wait until a flood is predicted, you may not be able to get flood insurance coverage in advance of the storm. The city's Stormwater Department provides a comprehensive flood information program to the public. Residents may access flood risk information and other flood information by calling the city Stormwater Department at 972-237-8321, and meeting with a department representative in person, or by accessing the City's website at www.gptx.org/floodplain. Do you want to know the flood zone of your property to determine your flood risk? The city can provide a map information service enabling all residents the ability to determine the flood zone of a specific property. The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) Flood Insurance Rate Maps (FIRMs) are available for viewing at City Hall. Current FIRMs can be found at the following link on the city's website: www. gptx.org/floodplain and at the FEMA Flood Map Store at https://msc.fema.gov/ portal. Don't let a flood wash away your financial future. Get flood insurance.... before it's too late!
