GRASS HEIGHT MAXIMUM: 10 INCHES

The maximum height for grass in Grand Prairie is 10 inches. It is unlawful for any person with ownership in a property in the City of Grand Prairie to have grass, weeds, rubbish or brush at a height greater than 10 inches, or for property to appear unsightly or unsanitary along, upon or across the sidewalk or street. Seven days after a property owner has been given notification of high grass. Code Compliance will issue citations and may have the property mowed. The resident will be billed and charged a \$150 administrative fee.

LAWN CARE - DON'T BAG IT!

As we return to spring and the promise of green lawns, the immediate thought might be, "What do I do with the grass clippings I will be collecting?" The short answer is don't collect it! By leaving the clippings on the lawn and allowing them to work their way back into the soil, you will help produce a naturally good looking lawn. There is no need for chemical fertilizers if done consistently. The rule of thumb is not to remove more than one-third of the leaf surface at any one time. For example; common Bermuda grass when 2-1/4" or less, should be moved at a setting of 1-1/2".

If your lawn has started sprouting weeds already, apply the mowing principles mentioned, and bag the weeds and grass clippings collected for your compost pile, as this is rich in nitrogen and is an essential component of composting. The composted material in turn provides a valuable natural soil amendment that can be used in your garden and also on your lawn as needed to reduce weeds. When severe weather happens, City of Grand Prairie departments like Grand Prairie Stormwater, the Office of Emergency Management, Streets, and Fire-Rescue activate to manage the city's flood protection systems and processes.

The City of Grand Prairie, the Federal Emergency Management Association (FEMA), and the National Weather Service (NWS) urge drivers to always follow these flood safety tips:

- Turn Around, Don't Drown®
- It is NEVER safe to drive or walk into flood waters.
- Heed all warning signs.
- Don't underestimate the power of water.
- Always be aware of your surroundings when driving.
- Use extra caution when driving or walking at night in storm conditions.

Residents can prepare for severe weather or flooding by knowing the implications of flood watches and warnings, having a preparedness kit of supplies, and developing a plan on how to reach family and friends during an emergency.

KITTEN SEASON IS HERE!



Unless there is an immediate threat, please leave kittens in place where their mother can find them, especially if they are too young to eat on their own. If you must intervene with kittens, you can help by providing in-home foster care until the kittens are 8 to 10 weeks of age. For more information visit gptx.org/paws.

SECURE CONFINEMENT FOR YOUR DOGS

It's a Must!



Animals should be kept inside, enclosed within a fenced-in yard, or walked on a leash when not in an escape-proof enclosure such as a kennel. To keep your dog from escaping or causing mischief try:

- A pet or child safety gate
- Crate training
- Exercise pen
- Outdoor dog run that is 100 sq. ft. for one dog and an additional 30 sq. ft. for each additional dog.

According to city ordinance Sec. 5-20 (c), it is a violation to place a dog in an area where the fencing or kennel materials are of insufficient height, durability, strength or spacing to keep the animal from being completely confined. City ordinance Sec. 5-55 (b) states that any animal while outside must have adequate shelter and water. Balconies are not adequate enclosures. Visit gptx.org/paws for a full list of city ordinances.
